the Department of the Interior laid down policies that would never qualify Indians for the intellectual enjoyments that civilized man has, as a standard to the blessings of plenty and wealth for the need of his house. The fellowing was found among your books of policy:

"TENTATIVE COURSE OF STUDY FOR UNITED STATES INDIAN SCHOOLS. -Department of the Interior

INTRODUCTION - second paragraph

Indian schools must train the Indian youth of both sexes, to take upon themselves the duties and responsibilities of citizenship. To do this, requires a system of schools and an organization, capable of preparing the Indian young people to carn a living (1) among their swn people, or, (2) away from the reservation home and in competition with their white brethren.

This does not contemplate a college or university, or even a preparatory school for college entrance."

With such a policy the Indian could never be in competition with his white brothren, nor could be ever learn the requirements that are needed to develop his Indian Nation.

A legal independent instrument capable of presenting a legal Sovereign attitude for Indians to other nations from Indian Nations is this briefing fulfilling the requirement, because the United States Government with Executive Orders, and Acts of Congress no longer has the jurisdiction to protect Trust, or Restricted status of Indian lands, or territories. (25 C.F.R. chapter one, appendix pg. 423, 424, 425, 426 - 1973)
