In a telephone conversation with a member of my host, I had to unlock one small phrase that identified the subject that would be required of me because our meeting at the Border-crossing at Nigra-Falls Ont, July 15, was to short and vague to establish the subject. She asked in a Kind, Centle, and remote manner- DON'T FORGET THE STORIES- LIKE THAT OF THE WOLF.

FIRST, I seldom speak about the Wolf, because traditional there is part of this Clan teachings that is completely left out, or the complete teaching are in half and Clan members are to travel to the land of the Cats to receit the balance.

SECOND, My subjects are useually legal and quite technical because the American Indian and his association and dealings with the United States is so complex that the average Attorney is no match for officials from the Bureau of Indian Affairs and for me to lecture to an audeince on these subjects requires some type of preschooling just to understand my simplest terms.

STORIES! Would have to be legends. Legends that a small child heard from his elders. Stories and legends that form the future for an Indian child. STORIFS! LEGENDS! A subject closely related to mythology.

For one lifestyle and culture, it is the A,B,C's and the 1,2,3's and for any other lifestyle, it is a primiative story told by an Indigenus.

I've given the idea *************** subject, much thought, because not quite three weeks ago I came to this city looking for a publisher of my latest manuscript. My sponser directed me to an Egyptian Curerator of a major Museum. I showed and could prove that the Egyptian culture did not die at 200 B.C. or 300 A.D. but continued on while before Colimbus. I even gave him a lingisic trial on the modern language of the Egyptian which can be traced back to the Medieval in which there are American Indian

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
